A Few Words from Fr. Ted NATIVITY, INCARNATION, CHRISTMAS

The Book of Common Prayer uses three different terms to refer to the celebration of Jesus' birth each December 25th. In the calendar of observances near the front of the book, the feast is called "The Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ." The Proper Preface to be used in the Great Thanksgiving at the Eucharist is simply titled "Incarnation." Elsewhere the word "Christmas" is used. It is tempting to say they are just three different words for the same thing, and that they are. Yet, each denotes this blessed event with its own meaning and emphasis.

Nativity per Miriam-Webster is "the process or circumstances of being born." As such we have all experienced our own unique nativity. We were born in a certain place, with certain people in attendance and with certain possibilities for the life we might lead. The professor in a developmental psychology course I took in college claimed that the single most traumatic event in every life was to be born. Having been accustomed to a warm, safe environment where our every need was accommodated, safe within our mother's womb and provided with the nourishment and hydration needed to survive, we really had no cares in the world. And then through a violent process of pushing and shoving and being forced through a narrow passage we came into a world of light and darkness, warmth and cold, hunger and thirst. That is being born; that is a nativity and Jesus experienced it just as we did.

We say that Jesus became incarnate. This was not something that happened all at once in a stable in Bethlehem of Judea. Incarnation means to take on flesh. While other New Testament texts hint

at a pre-existent Son of God, the Gospel According to John makes explicit, especially in its Prologue, that "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God... And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us..." (John 1:1, 10a). With that flesh he took on all of our weakness, all of our fears and the certainty of some day giving it up. Jesus' Incarnation did not happen in the brief time of being born. His taking on flesh, his becoming human, was the culmination of God's love for his creation, his determination to do whatever it took for us to be reconciled with him and the obedience of the Son to become Incarnate for our sakes. In the lyrics to a famous Christmas hymn, Christina



Rosetti wrote that "Love came down, love all lovely, love divine." Jesus, the Incarnate Son of God, was the God's love enfleshed.

And finally, we all know December 25th as Christmas Day. Records indicate some celebrations of the Lord's birth as early as the second century, CE. It seems that it was some time in the fourth century when the date of those celebrations was fixed on December the 25th, which corresponds with the winter solstice occurring three or four days earlier. Naming this date as "Christmas" came at a much later time. Coming from Old and Middle English, it means "Christ's Mass or the Mass of Christ." It is literally the Mass commemorating Jesus' Nativity and Incarnation. In this sense, it says more about us than about Jesus. Christmas is our response of thanksgiving for love that is great enough to take on flesh, to live and die, for each of us.

Let us celebrate Jesus' birth and becoming one of us with the Christ Mass on Wednesday, December 24, 2025 at 7:00 pm.
